Read Chapter 9 of Jacob Stegenga's *Care and Cure* (available on Blackboard). Then answer the following questions. Your answers should be uploaded in Blackboard.

Took drug	10	190
Took nothing	20	180

- 1) Use the table above to answer the following questions:
 - 1a) What proportion of participants in the experimental group had a heart attack?
 - 1b) What proportion of participants in the control group had a heart attack?
 - 1c) What is the relative risk (RR) of taking the drug?
 - 1d) What is the relative risk reduction (RRR) of taking the drug?
 - 1e) What is the risk difference of taking the drug?
 - 1f) How many patients would you have to give the drug to before you could expect that it would prevent one heart attack? (This is the NNT).
- 2) What is the connection between a p-value and statistical significance? In the above case, assume that our null hypothesis is "this drug makes no difference." Now imagine I do some statistics and tell you that p-value of this result is about .08 and thus the result is not statistically significant at the .05 level (this is correct). Which of you the following should you infer:
 - 2a) Definitely, for sure, we know this drug prevents heart attacks. No question.
 - 2b) We should reject the null hypothesis. We should believe it does reduce heart attacks. But we don't know for sure. We might be wrong.
 - 2c) Don't reject the null hypothesis.. But there is some evidence that the drug prevents heart attacks. A little bit. Maybe not too much.
 - 2d) You have no evidence that the drug reduces heart attacks. But you also have no evidence the other way either. So you have learned basically nothing.
 - 2e) The result was not significant. So we have some evidence that the drug does not work.
 - 2f) You need more information to answer this question (what information?)
 - 2g) Some other answer (what?)

Explain your answer.
